

Call For Abstracts

The HGS welcomes papers on subjects concerning highway related geological and geotechnical problems, and the solutions developed to address them. Strong consideration is given to problem solving. Topics encouraged (but not limited to) include:

- Landslides and rockfall
- Karst terrain
- Geotechnical innovations and instrumentation
- Post wildfire debris flows
- Seismic hazard and mitigation
- Rock and soil slope design
- Retaining structures
- Resiliency and management of geotechnical assets
- Geotechnical asset management
- Earthquake induced failures
- Geophysical test methods
- Foundations
- Bedrock and structural geology challenges in transportation
- Risk management
- Ground improvements

Abstracts should be 250 words or less. The deadline for submission has been extended to **March 23, 2026**.

Please include the name, address, phone number, and email address of all authors. Abstracts should be submitted electronically in MS Word, 12-point Times New Roman font, double spaced and left justified. Authors of accepted abstracts will be notified by April 13, 2026. An electronic copy of accepted papers must be received by July 15, 2026. Abstracts will appear in the printed proceedings. Full papers will be published in the Symposium proceedings in electronic format which will be distributed to all attendees.
